


A message from our President

Awning Over the Front of the GSDL Building

The committee of the GSDL have sought and gained approval from Dogs NSW to erect an awning across the front of our building at Orchard Hills.

This awning will provide comfort and protection from all weather elements for those members attending training and our shows. It is intended to place suitable tables and chairs along the veranda where members can sit and enjoy a cup of coffee and a chat whilst watching the show. It is not intended for members exhibiting to 'set up camp' with their exhibits.

The cost of this awning is \$11,440 and the committee feel it is well worthwhile spending some of accumulated funds on the members comfort and building improvement. In regard to this expenditure, the committee would like the approval of the membership.

We are also negotiating with Dogs NSW to have the centre covering in the bitch ring upgraded to match the one Dogs NSW have replaced in the dog ring. At the last show when it rained, we had to erect a tent under the ring cover to stop the judge from being drenched.

We believe Dogs NSW spent \$8,500 on the new cover in the dog ring, however it is anticipated that they will require the GSDL to contribute towards a new cover in the bitch ring. We will, of course, keep members advised.

Hip Dysplasia—DNA Test Development

There are a number of inherited joint and cartilage diseases of dogs. Osteochondrosis dessicans (OCD), luxating patella (dislocating knees), fragmented coronoid process (FCP - Elbow dysplasia – one of the three possible causes), un-united anconeal process (UAP – another cause of Elbow dysplasia) and avascular necrosis of the femoral head, to name a few. Yet, despite pre-breeding radiographs to gain an "A" stamp, along with selective breeding programs, and despite the development of various programs around the world to improve the breeding of sounder hips in dogs (BVA Scheme developed in conjunction with well-known German Shepherd enthusiast and genetic guru, Malcom Willis; Penn-Hip Scheme Developed by Gail Smith at Pennsylvania University), Canine Hip Dysplasia still remains the most common inherited orthopaedic condition in dogs.

Over the years in Australia, the incidence of Hip Dysplasia has decreased in German Shepherds, however there are still a number of cases being reported every year. Despite the general trend comparing the number of cases in the eighties with those early this century, some people are suggesting, anecdotally at least, that there might be a rise in the incidence of Hip Dysplasia over the last few years. Certainly, it is difficult to get true estimates because many cases of younger dogs with HD are not reported. Further, many people who have a dog radiographed for the scheme, but find that individual is an obvious failure, decide not to submit the radiographs. This not only skews the true incidence of the disease but also prevents another reasonable test to avoid breeding HD, namely by progeny testing. Currently, one scientific published article from Germany states that the incidence of Hip Dysplasia in German Shepherds is 35%.

Analysis of DNA has now been proposed as a possible answer to our question: **How do I avoid breeding animals that develop Canine Hip Dysplasia?** The problem with this logic is that HD is a polygenic disease. That is to say, there are several genes that result in the development of this condition.

In the development of DNA profiling for diseases or a particular effect of a drug on a patient, scientists have identified "Single-Nucleotide Polymorphism" or SNPs. These can cause a simple difference in the manufacture of proteins (which are literally written in the genes of the animal), thus resulting in a different expression between individuals. Much work has been put into genome mapping of dogs because they are so similar to humans. .../continued next page

Hip Dysplasia—DNA Test Development continued

Researchers have said that the dog genome is a rearranged version of the human genome – it is divided into roughly 70 different segments then arranged on a greater number of chromosomes (Dogs have 78 chromosomes while humans only have 46 – so who is the superior species?). Genetic diseases of the two species are also very similar, thus the work in canines has benefited both dogs and humans alike.

Canine Hip Dysplasia SNPs have now been reported in an article (PLOS I one – Identification and Validation of Quantitative Trait Loci (QTL) for Canine Hip Dysplasia (CHD) in German Shepherd Dogs) published May 6, 2014 by Ottmar DistI and Lena Fels (University of Veterinary Medicine, Hannover Germany). To identify the common alleles (gene variants) associated with Canine Hip Dysplasia, they examined 96 dogs with mild, moderate and severe Hip Dysplasia, analysing the results by using a canine high density SNP chip. The result identified five SNPs associated with Canine Hip Dysplasia.

To now examine this work for possible use in the field - that is to say, with our breeding programs - a study has been proposed by Professor Bill Ballard (University of NSW) and Dr. Robert Zammit (Vineyard Veterinary Hospital) that will examine one thousand previously radiographed dogs.

The study involves taking DNA from German Shepherds that have been radiographed under Australian scoring conditions. The bulk will be under the auspices of dogs radiographed under the GSD National Council Scheme. However, as previously stated, as some animals with Hip Dysplasia never make submission to the scheme, their radiographs will be read and their DNA submitted as this will be a crucial addition to the study.

The samples are allotted a "DNA Number". The Hip Dysplasia results are recorded but are not examined until the DNA mapping generates a separate result of the hip status of the animal according to the DNA analyses. This will then be compared to the radiograph result, examining the correlation between the two methods. All individual results will be kept anonymous as this is a population study. If a correlation is found to be strong then the second part of the study (probably some two to three years away!) will commence. At this stage, we will examine DNA from sires and dams to see if there is predictability of results.

Obviously this is a long and involved study but it leaves a legacy to the breed that cannot be over-stated. In plain English, if this works, future generations of breeders (and maybe even you), will be able to breed towards making Hip Dysplasia a historical event in the breed.

What is needed from you to advance the study is your co-operation in collecting DNA from radiographed dogs, whether they have passed or failed. Indeed, failed animals will be invaluable to the study so please assist the investigation by bringing those animals along for DNA collection. Rob Zammit will be travelling around the country to collect samples along with copies of hip results. This is done under the auspices of German Shepherd National Council and your local club will let you know the dates and location that this will occur in your State. Hope you can help.
